




Mission, Vision, and Purpose

Alaska's Education Challenge






Five Shared Strategic Priorities:

- 5. Improve the safety and well-being of students through school partnerships with families, communities, and tribes





K-3 Alaska Native Language Arts Reading Standards

The purpose of this project is to develop Alaska Native Language Arts Standards for kindergarten through 3rd grade for adoption by the Alaska State Board of Education. These developed standards will provide a critical support for instruction of Alaska Native languages because the standards will make it clear that reading in Alaska Native language is valid for demonstrating 3rd grade reading proficiency.




